2002 cohort of UK Medical Graduates

Summary report of surveys conducted in 2003, 2005 and 2007

Produced January 2011

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Introduction

This report describes the results of three surveys of the cohort of 4436 doctors who qualified from UK medical schools in 2002.

The first survey was conducted in 2003/4, the first year after the cohort graduated. Mailing for this survey was completed in April 2003, and late replies were received up to May 2004.

The second survey was conducted in 2005/6, the third year after the cohort graduated. Mailing for this survey was completed in June 2005, and late replies were received up to June 2006.

The third survey was conducted in 2007-2009, the fifth year after the cohort graduated. Mailing for this survey was completed in Nov 2007, and late replies were received up to June 2009.

This report describes the main results from all three surveys, focusing mainly on those questions which were included in all surveys. These areas include their career choices and the milestones in their careers. It also contains some information about their views, attitudes and future intentions. It is not intended as an analytical report and does not seek to relate data from this cohort to that obtained from other cohorts.

We expect this report to be of interest to medical workforce planners, policymakers, researchers and others with an interest in medical careers.

Cohort size and response to survey

The cohort comprises 4436 doctors (1976 men, 2460 women). Excluding from the denominator those who had declined to participate, those who had died, and those who could not be contacted, the response to the first survey was 65.3% (2778/4257). For men the response rate was 57.6% (1091/1890), and for women 71.3% (1687/2367). The response to the second survey was 64.8% (2748/4243). For men the response rate was 55.9% (1063/1900), and for women 71.9% (1685/2343). The response to the third survey was 61.9% (2553/4124). For men the response rate was 53.8% (984/1829), and for women 68.4% (1569/2295).

Demographics of the respondents

Domestic situation at the time of the third survey

At the time of response to the third survey, 64.5% were living with a spouse or partner (men 64.0%, women 64.9%); 80.7% had no children under 16 years of age (men 77.4%, women 82.7%); and 3.9% had dependent adults living with them (men 4.1%, women 3.7%).

Demographic variables based on the doctors who responded to at least one survey

3537 doctors (2087 women, 1450 men, 59% women), or 80% of the cohort, replied to at least one of the 3 surveys.

Age

The median age of the respondents as at September 2002 was 24.2 years (men 24.4 years, women 24.1 years).

Nationality

81% of respondents were UK citizens, with 3% having joint UK nationality.

Family home at the time of application to medical school

Similarly 84% of doctors who responded to at least one of the three surveys were living in a family home within the UK at the time of application to medical school.

Ethnicity

10% of respondents provided no detail of their ethnic group. Of those who provided information, non-white students comprised 27%, the largest group being that of Indian respondents, followed by Chinese (Table 3). 211 respondents were overseas students (6%).

Parents medically qualified

5.8% of respondents across the three surveys had parents who were both medically qualified (Table 4). 9% had a father who was qualified.

Qualifications prior to medical school

7.3% of respondents across the three surveys had obtained professional qualifications prior to entering medical school. The results for men and women were very similar.

242 doctors provided further detail of their qualifications. Of these, 10% had a dental degree, 26% had a medical-related degree, 48% had a science degree and 4% had a nursing or paramedical qualification. Only 4.2% of women had qualified in dentistry compared with 19% of men.

Non-clinical qualifications during medical school

Satisfaction with current job

To obtain a measure of job satisfaction the responders were asked to score five statements on a five point scale covering strongly agree, agree, neither agree nor disagree, disagree and strongly disagree. The statements were

I find enjoyment in my current post
I am doing interesting and challenging work
I feel dissatisfied in my current post
Most days I am enthusiastic about my work
I am often bored with my work

Scores of 1 to 5 were assigned to the responses (with scales for each responder reversed for the 1st, 2nd and 4th statements) and an overall job satisfaction score in the range 5 to 25 was calculated. The questions were asked in all three surveys.

The median job satisfaction score was 17 in the first survey, 20 in the second survey and 21 in the third survey.

Satisfaction with time for family and leisure

Respondents were asked to express, on a scale from 1 to 10 (not at all satisfied), (extremely satisfied), their satisfaction with the amount of time their work left them for family, social and recreational activities.

The median score for satisfaction with time for leisure was 6 for the first survey, and 7 for the second and third surveys.

Career Plans

Respondents were asked a set of questions regarding their current employment and career plans and intentions. Table 9 summarises the responses to the questions, with percentages calculated with reference to the overall response to each question (and in parentheses, where relevant, the percentage of all respondents). Each survey asked a different set of questions, hence each survey is reported separately. Percentages may not add up to 100% due to rounding.

Final choice of long-term career

The following section summarises the responses to questions regarding career choices. Respondents were first asked whether they had *Definitely, Probably* or *Not really* decided on their choice of specialty for their long-term career. They were then asked to list, in order, up to three choices of long-term career specialty in order of preference (with the option to indicate 'tied' choices). Respondents were then asked to rate a series of twelve factors as either having influenced their career choice *A great deal, A little*, or *Not at all.* These questions were asked in all three surveys, and the questions and attitude statements appear in full in each questionnaire (Appendixes 1-3).

In the first and third surveys, a further question was asked about specialties which the respondent had considered but discarded as options (in the first survey the question related to *long term career choice*, and in the third survey it related to specialties applied for in *post-graduate training*).

Tables 10-13 and Figure 1 summarise the responses to these questions. Please note that not all respondents to each survey responded to each question, hence totals may vary from question to question, and deviations from 100% may occur due to rounding. Where first choice of specialty is given, it should be noted that this is the choice indicated in the first box on the survey, and does not take tied choices into account. In the first survey, 17.9% of all respondents indicated a tie between either first and second choices or all three choices. This figure for the second survey had fallen to 11.7%, and for the third survey it was 6%.





Women: within each group of 3 bars, the top is year 1, middle is year 3 and bottom is year 5




