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INTRODUCTION

This report describes the results of three surveys of the cohort of 3667 doctors who qualified from UK medical schools in 1993.

The first survey was conducted in 1994, the first year after the cohort graduated. Mailing for this survey was completed in April 1995.

The second survey was conducted in 1996, the third year after the cohort graduated. Mailing for this survey was completed in February 1997.

This report describes the main results from both surveys, focusing mainly on those questions which were included in all surveys. These areas include their career choices, future career plans and their views about their working conditions, support, training and careers advice. It is not intended as an analytical report and does not seek to relate data from this cohort to that obtained from other cohorts.

We expect this report to be of interest to medical workforce planners, policymakers, researchers and others with an interest in medical careers.

COHORT SIZE AND RESPONSE TO SURVEY

The cohort comprises 3667 doctors (1952 men, 1715 women). Excluding from the denominator those who had declined to participate, those who had died, and those who could not be contacted, the response to the first survey was 72.2% (2621/3628). For men the response rate was 67.2% (1296/1929), and for women 78.0% (1325/1699). The response to the second survey was 79.0% (2776/3515). For men the response rate was 74.7% (1391/1861), and for women 83.7% (1385/1654).

DEMOGRAPHICS OF THE RESPONDENTS

Domestic situation at the time of the second survey

At the time of response to the second survey, 50.1% were living with a spouse or partner (men 50.4%, women 49.9%); 92.0% had no children under 16 years of age (men 90.7%, women 93.1%); and 1.3% had dependent adults living with them (men 1.3%, women 1.2%).

Demographic variables based on the doctors who responded to at least one survey

3133 doctors (1545 women, 1588 men, 49% women), or 85% of the cohort, replied to at least one of the 2 surveys.

Age

The median age of the respondents as at September 1994 was 25.1 years (25.1 for men and women).

Nationality

92% of respondents were UK citizens, with 1% having joint UK nationality.

Ethnicity

19% of respondents provided no detail of their ethnic group. Of those who provided information, non-white students comprised 17%, the largest group being that of Indian respondents, followed by Chinese (Table 2).

Qualifications prior to medical school

Non-clinical qualifications during medical school

1070 doctors (602 men, 468 women) had gained an intercalated degree during their time at medical school. Of all respondents, this was 34% overall (1070/3133): 30% of women (468/1545) and 38% of men (602/1588).

CAREER PLANS

Respondents were asked a set of questions regarding their current employment and career plans and intentions. Table 5 summarises the responses to the questions, with percentages calculated with reference to the overall response to each question (and in parentheses, where relevant, the percentage of all respondents). Each survey asked a different set of questions, hence each survey is reported separately. Percentages may not add up to 100% due to rounding.

FINAL CHOICE OF LONG-TERM CAREER

The following section summarises the responses to questions regarding career choices. Respondents were first asked whether they had *Definitely*, *Probably* or *Not really* decided on their choice of specialty for their long-term career. They were then asked to list, in order, up to three choices of long-term career specialty in order of preference (with the option to indicate 'tied' choices). Respondents were then asked to rate a series of twelve factors as either having influenced their career choice *A great deal*, *A little*, or *Not at all*. These questions were asked in the first and third surveys, and the questions and attitude statements appear in full in each questionnaire (Appendixes 1 and 2).






Figure 2: Factors contributing to specialty choice - Year 3

Tables 6-8 and Figures 1 and 2 summarise the responses to these questions. Please note that not all respondents to each survey responded to each question, hence totals may vary from question to question, and deviations from 100% may occur due to rounding. Where first choice of specialty is given, it should be noted that this is the choice indicated in the first box on the survey, and does not take tied choices into account. In the first survey, 7.3% of all respondents indicated a tie between either first and second choices or all three choices. This figure for the second survey had fallen to 4.0%.



Figure 1: Factors contributing to specialty choice - Year 1

Figure 3: Views and attitudes - Men





Figure 4: Views and attitudes - Women
