## Dr Ray Lovett

Australian Institute of Aboriginal and  
Torres Strait Island Studies (AIATSIS)



Ray Lovett is a Health Research Fellow at the *AIATSIS* Centre for Health and Wellbeing. He was the first Aboriginal to graduate with a PhD in Epidemiology at *The Australian National University (ANU)*. He is Visiting Professional at the Centre for Research and Action in Public Health at the *University of Canberra* and Adjunct Postdoctoral Fellow at the National Centre for Epidemiology and Population Health at The ANU. Ray has held numerous positions aimed at advancing the health of Indigenous populations. He is a member of the Australian Government *Department of Health (DoH)* and *Australian Capital Territory's (ACT) Human Research Ethics Committees* and is an active member of the *ACT Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs Association*. Ray received the **Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Student Award** at the Lowitja Institute's annual congress in 2012 and was awarded **The ANU's student of the year** in 2013.

## Raglan Maddox

Raglan Maddox has worked with the Australia Government at the *DoH* on Tackling Indigenous Smoking, lectured and tutored on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies, undertaken an internship at the *World Health Organization*, and volunteered as a Health Promotion Field Officer at the *Columbia Asia Medical Centre* in Miri, Malaysia. Raglan is a member of the ACT Government's *Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Tobacco Control Advisory Group*. Raglan has a Masters in Public Health and is currently a PhD candidate at the Centre for Research and Action in Public Health, *University of Canberra*. He is exploring the effectiveness of tobacco control among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the ACT region, with the aim to evaluate, inform and improve community health programs at the grass roots level.
